PULLMAN ARTSPACE LOFTS

Create a New History

Pullman Artspace Lofts is a mixeduse affordable live/work space for artists and their families developed in partnership with Chicago Neighborhood Initiatives (CNI) and Pullman Arts.

The Development Team chose a site located on Langley Avenue, just south of 111th Street, consisting of approximately 18,500 square feet of vacant land book-ended by two historic apartment buildings. The project provides the opportunity to integrate historic preservation with cutting edge new construction and an iconic set of buildings that anchor Pullman's eastern boundary. The project includes 38 affordable live/work units, exhibition space, and ample community space.

Originally, the entire community was designed and built as worker housing for the Pullman Company, then subsequently was divested from the Company by court order in 1907. Since then, Pullman has been largely a working class Chicago neighborhood. In the late 1960s, a local chamber of commerce proposed razing south Pullman in favor of a light industrial park. Local residents, organized by the Pullman Civic Organization, responded by securing city, state and national historic landmark status to save their community.

Pullman has attracted significant attention to protect and promote its historic assets. On February 19, 2015
President Obama designated the Pullman Historic District a national monument. The goal of the Pullman Historic District is to preserve and interpret the significant labor, industrial, social, civil rights and architectural history associated with the Pullman legacy.

Among Chicago's 50 city landmark districts, Pullman is the only one that also enjoys state and national landmark status. It is the only one anchored by a state historic site. One of the oldest landmark districts in Chicago, it is, by a significant margin, the largest – fully 10 percent of all city landmark properties are in Pullman. Each year, more than 50,000 visitors come to Pullman for its annual House Tour, Garden Walk, state historic site events, guided and self-guided tours. Pullman is also garnering recognition as a unique place to live and work. In 2011, Pullman was designated one of the country's 10 Great Neighborhoods by the American Planning Association.

Anchoring a Historic Neighborhood

The neighborhood of Pullman is a planned community famed for its urban design and architecture. On February 19, 2015, President Obama visited Chicago's Historic Pullman District to establish the district as a National Monument within the National Park System. Pullman National Monument tells the story of American opportunity and diversity intertwined with arts and culture and a legacy of significant labor, industrial, social and civil rights issues.

In April 2015, AIA Chicago and the National Parks Conservation Association brought together urban planners, architects, landscape architects, engineers, economists and historians to create a plan for development of the Pullman National Monument neighborhood. Pullman Artspace is prominently featured in the vision for that plan titled "Positioning Pullman."

Through a generous grant from the Richard H. Driehaus Foundation, the development team held an architectural design competition to engage an architectural team that could design a building to honor the history and character of Pullman's landmark community, attract artist from outside the community, create a space that spurs creativity, and integrate the building into the built and human fabric of the community. The Chicagobased firm Stantec won the competition and have been named architects on the Pullman Artspace project. Stantec's exceptional

design for the Pullman Artspace project will meet contemporary needs while referencing and honoring Pullman's legacy as a destination for skilled craftsman, artisans and artists.

The project will be rich with amenities available to all residents, including a large gallery, community work space, and gathering areas, and indoor bike storage.

Pullman Today

While redeveloping the NKB campus, Artspace is committed to opening new pathways to opportunity in Northeast Minneapolis. The neighborhood was historically comprised of an Eastern European immigrant community that transformed when major industries left the neighborhood, providing space for artists to create in large, abandoned warehouses, such as the NKB. Northeast has since become a highly sought after destination, rightly renowned as a place to interact with cultural producers and discover fine dining and hip breweries.

Commodification of this rich culture, however, threatens deepening disparities. Through equitable development, Artspace will address barriers in the Northeast Minneapolis Arts District by providing 84 units of housing for artists earning 30—80% AMI, as well as their families, aligning with a city-wide strategy to advance the 2040 Plan and its emphasis on affordable housing. In addition, Artspace will create new, affordable studio and commercial spaces, accessible to people of color, people low in income, minority-owned businesses, and others.
